Chair Méndez called the meeting to order at 12:08 p.m. with a quorum established.

2. Hybrid Meeting Guidelines

Tyler Deke reviewed the hybrid meeting guidelines.

Motion 1: Chair Méndez moved approval of the draft March 17, 2026, Budget Committee meeting minutes, the draft March 31, 2026, Policy Board meeting minutes, and the draft April 17, 2026, Policy Board meeting minutes as presented. David Abbas seconded the motion which passed 4 to 0.

Motion 2: David Abbas moved to reappoint James Dorofi for a second 3-year term on the BMPO Budget Committee and Technical Advisory Committee. Abbey Driscoll seconded the motion which passed 4 to 0.

6. Metropolitan Transportation Improvement Program (MTIP) Amendment

One amendment to the 2024-2027 MTIP was proposed involving changes to the project scope, construction phases, and length of the US97 Multi-Use Trail that will connect Lava Butte to the High Desert Museum and moving funding for the previously planned northern trail segment extending toward Knott Rd to a future project.

Abbey Driscoll explained that ODOT had delayed construction of the trail segment connecting to Knott Rd until 2028 to provide time to coordinate with Bend Parks and Recreation District (BPRD) and landowners regarding easements and trailhead connectivity at Knott Rd. She noted ODOT had received several public comments.

Motion 3: Chair Méndez moved approval of the proposed amendment to the 2024-2027 MTIP, as presented. Blaine Wruck seconded the motion which passed 4 to 0. (Ayes: Méndez (City of Bend), Abbas (City of Bend), Driscoll (ODOT), Wruck (Deschutes County). Nays: None.)

7. Deschutes County Transportation Safety Action Plan (TSAP) Update

Blaine Wruck presented an overview of the updated Deschutes County TSAP and noted rural county roads outside of city limits had been included as new study areas. He reviewed Crash Data Analysis results including fatality statistics, crash types, risky behaviors, and vulnerable roadway users. Network Screening was used to identify intersections and roadway segments with high-crash concentrations, help develop the High Injury Network (HIN), and prioritize safety projects and systemic treatments. School Area Safety Audits had been completed for several rural schools on county roads to identify site-specific safety improvements. He described non-infrastructure safety measures and public engagement efforts. The Board of County Commissioners had adopted the updated Deschutes County TSAP on March 18, 2026.

Questions were addressed about utilizing site-specific and systemic safety improvement tools; law enforcement being responsible to investigate whether distracted driving due to phone use was a contributing factor to a crash; excluding state highways from the TSAP study areas, but partnering with ODOT to improve intersections between state highways and county roads; effective tools to reduce speeding; potentially improving



transportation safety by improving transit; and comparing crash fatality data from the Deschutes County TSAP to crash fatality data available through the Oregon Transportation Safety Data Explorer.

8. Cascades East Transit (CET) Fare Implementation & Service Changes

Bob Townsend talked about current legislation that could impact transit including the possible transportation bill and amendments to SB 1544 language resulting in Central Oregon Intergovernmental Council (COIC) becoming eligible to receive transit funding directly as a Qualified Entity. He gave an update on bus fare re-implementation including newly registered accounts, group passes, core service fare revenue, and the upcoming Try Transit Week incentive event in June 2026. He described CET system improvements, route expansions, and service changes made during the previous year or anticipated soon. He highlighted variables impacting CET's Budget and noted the Bend Transit Vision working group was meeting monthly. Additional data slides were included in the presentation for the meeting.

Questions were addressed about COIC anticipating saving 5 to 10 percent in administrative costs, or about \$500,000, due to becoming a Qualified Entity; peak hours for transit on 3rd St between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.; grant funding for bus routes providing access to Sno-Parks and other recreational areas running out after summer 2026; CET's contract with Mt. Bachelor Ski Resort being renegotiated after expiring this year, potentially resulting in service reductions to recreational areas; and qualifications to apply for reduced bus fares.

9. US97 Safety Funding Support Letter

Tyler Deke said Deschutes, Jefferson, and Klamath County Commissions had approved and submitted a letter to the Oregon Legislature urging for safety funding for the segment of US97 between the California border and Madras, Oregon. BMPO Staff made minor modifications to the letter, including stating the need for bicycle and pedestrian safety funding for cities along the US97 Corridor.

Motion 4: Chair Méndez moved to approve the US97 Safety Letter to the Oregon Legislature, as presented. David Abbas seconded the motion which passed 3 to 0 to 1. (Ayes: Méndez (City of Bend), Abbas (City of Bend), Wruck (Deschutes County). Nays: None. Abstain: Driscoll (ODOT).)



10. Other Business

Bend TSAP Update status: Tyler Deke reported the TSAP online open house would close today, having received over 1,000 general comments and close to 700 comments on the interactive map. He talked with the consultant team yesterday about compiling and overlaying data from the public comments onto existing safety information to look for trends and identify site-specific or systemic safety improvements indicated in Bend.

Chair Mendez stated comments could still be submitted today to the online open house available at <https://bendoregon.gov/transportationsafety>.

BMPO letter of support for Bend's SS4A grant application: Tyler Deke reported the City would apply for an SS4A grant soon to purchase cameras to report speed and volume or use for video analytics and near miss analysis, which could allow a more proactive approach to addressing potential safety issues. He asked the Policy Board to consider approving the draft support letter.

Chair Méndez emphasized the need to consider camera policies to protect privacy and avoid creating databases that could be used for unintended purposes. He noted red light and speeding cameras had been scheduled to begin issuing citations but would be delayed to give the Bend Police Department time to work on the system. He encouraged Board members to consider potentially shifting long-term investments toward a rail system rather than spending tens of millions of dollars on highway paving projects.

11. Public Comment

Bob Townsend responded to James Dorofi's question about bus service to the new library, stating that Route 6 had been adjusted last week to begin serving the new library on its opening day.

Greg Bryant had previously asked the Board to allocate \$30,000 – \$35,000 for roads in Deschutes River Woods (DRW), which was not done. He planned to attend an annual meeting tomorrow in DRW to present his findings that being in the BMPO did not financially benefit DRW in comparison to the maintenance funding provided to the City.

Councilor Méndez noted the BMPO had supported transit funding for DRW.

Stacie Fritz said red light camera infrastructure could be used in training for Police Officers, Sheriffs, and State Patrol Troopers, and stated the City needed to give semi-trucks their own route to get them off City streets. She suggested making a business or a chart to share information about federal, state, and city funding opportunities, and she encouraged contacting United Way Central Oregon regarding potential transportation funding.



12. Next Meeting & Adjournment

The next meeting of the BMPO Policy Board is scheduled for June 18, 2026 at 10:00 a.m.

Chair Méndez adjourned the meeting at 1:33 p.m.



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PROMISSORY NOTE

For value received, the Bend Metropolitan Planning Organization promises to pay to the City of Bend, Oregon the amounts described below according to the terms and conditions of this Promissory Note:

Purpose

The loan amounts provided below are related to expenses in the 2025-2026 fiscal year that are eligible to be funded with grant revenue to the Bend Metropolitan Planning Organization.

Loan Amount

The amount advanced by the City of Bend not to exceed one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00).

Interest

Interest will not be charged.

Repayment

Sources of repayment will be grant funds to be received in July 2026. The Loan Amount described above is payable in one lump sum to the City of Bend General Fund immediately upon receipt of the grant funds but no later than July 31, 2026.

Remedies

The City of Bend may exercise any right or remedy available by law. All remedies under this promissory note are cumulative and not exclusive. Any election to pursue one remedy shall not preclude the exercise of any other remedy.

Security Agreement

The Bend Metropolitan Planning Organization agrees to the following:



1. Bend Metropolitan Planning Organization owes the City of Bend the Loan Amount shown above for current operations in advance of grant revenues being available. The City shall have a secured interest in the grant funds to be received by the Bend Metropolitan Planning Organization to secure repayment of funds advanced pursuant to this Promissory Note.
2. The amount owed by the Bend Metropolitan Planning Organization shall be paid according to the terms and conditions stated above.

**Re: Annual Allocations of FY28-FY30 State Highway Funds (SHF)
Awarded to City of Bend Transportation and Mobility Department**

On April 18, 2025, the Policy Board awarded the City of Bend Transportation and Mobility Department SHF funds for fiscal years 2028-2030. The original motion language is provided below:

“I move to approve the distribution of the remaining \$581,570 dollars of FY28-FY30 State Highway Fund annual allocations with a focus on street preservation on greenways, key bicycle and pedestrian routes, low stress networks, and to include quick builds, safe crossings, support traffic calming, and other safety-oriented enhancements.”

The intent of this agenda item is to better clarify the awarded amounts expected to be used for “quick builds, safe crossings, support traffic calming, and other safety-oriented enhancements”. The clarifying language, if necessary, will be included in the BMPO/City funding agreement.

The Board will be asked to consider amending the previously adopted motion.

NOTE: SHF requests for Deschutes River Woods and a historical look at BMPO funds to street preservation will be provided at the meeting.
