2024-2027 MTIP – Overview

- Short-term (4-year) listing
 - Federal fiscal years 2024 through 2027
 - Transportation projects, programs, expenditures
- Amended as needed – 2 types of amendments
 - Administrative (89 processed since adoption)
 - Full (49 processed since adoption)

 - Amended project list (posted quarterly)
 - Amendment log (posted quarterly)

2024-2027 MTIP – Proposed Amendment

- One (1) proposed amendment
 - Project #24498
 - Amendment (#24-27-3794): Add new project using Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) program savings.
 - Project Name: US97: Central Oregon & Oakridge ADA Curb Ramps
 - Project Description: Design for future construction of curb ramps to meet compliance with the ADA standards.
 - Administrator (delivery): ODOT
 - Applicant: ODOT
 - Regulatory Agency: FHWA
 - Total Current Estimate: \$1,109,592

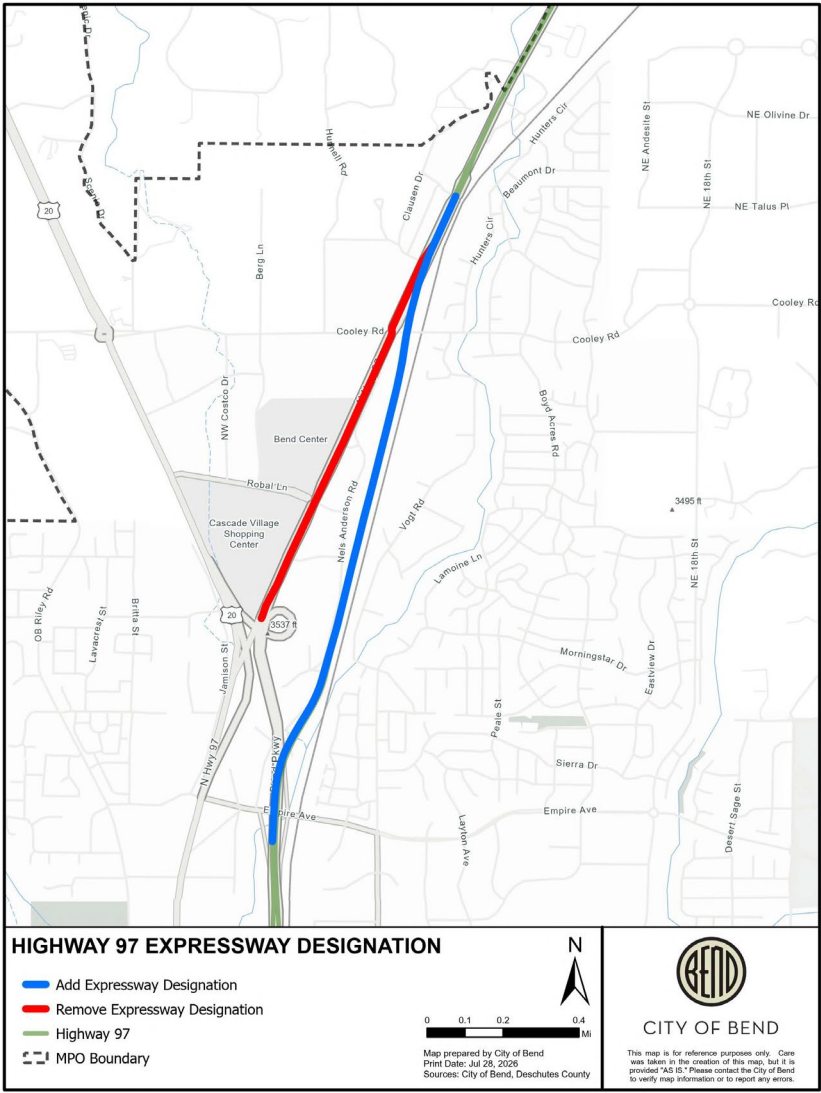
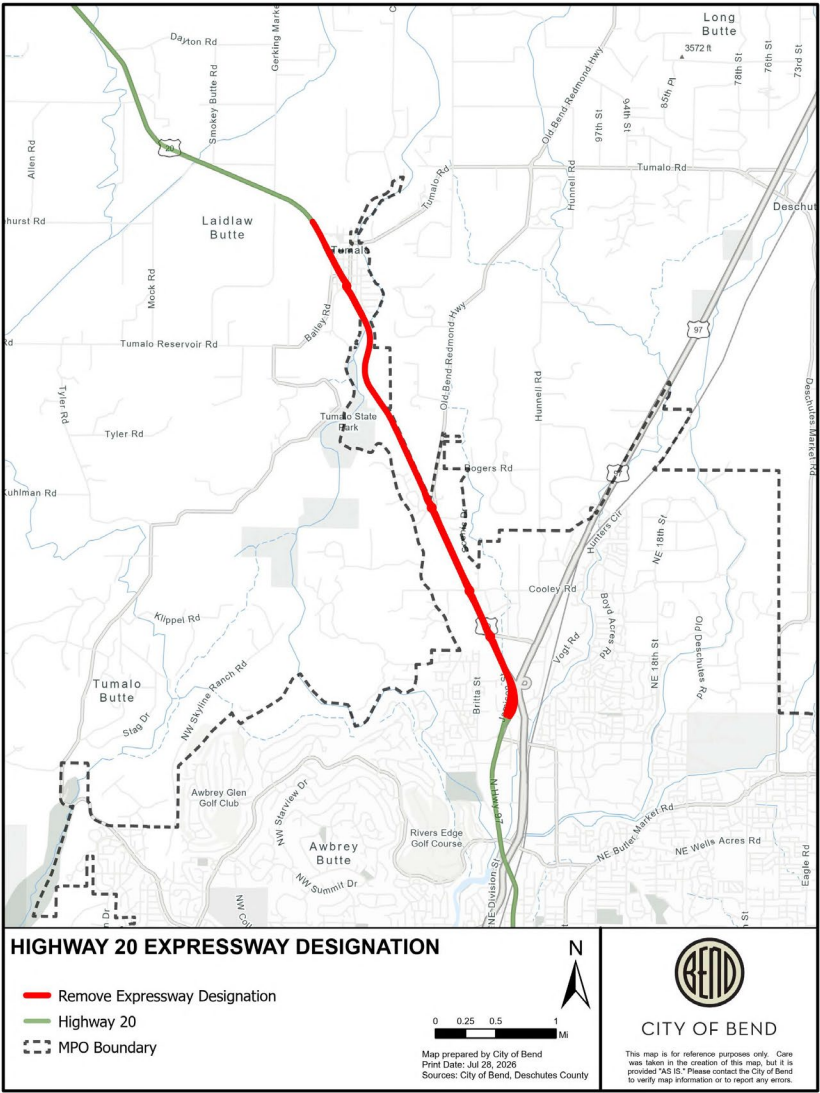
Background

- Oregon Highway Plan (OHP) includes classifications for all ODOT highways
- Expressway classification
 - Provide for interurban travel and connections to ports and major recreation areas
 - Have moderate to high speeds with limited bicycle and pedestrian facilities (those functions are typically separated)
 - Designations must be reviewed every 6 years
 - Additional information – Attachment B

Review Process

- Proposed Expressway changes within BMPO
 - Remove Expressway designation on US20 from just north of Empire Ave to west of Tumalo
 - Remove Expressway designation on Business 97
 - Add Expressway designation on new US97 alignment
 - Retain Expressway designation on US97 south of Empire
 - US97 is part of the National Highway System
 - US97 is part of the State Highway Freight System and serves local, regional and statewide freight traffic
 - Expressway designation may help in securing federal funding for future improvements
- ODOT met with local agency staff (City and MPO) to review potential changes
- Public review process open through Sept 4

Reauthorization 101: What Is It & Why Does It Matter?

01 What Is Reauthorization?

Congress periodically passes a multi-year law that authorizes federal surface transportation programs and sets funding levels and policy provisions for highways, transit, bridges, safety, and planning.

02 When Does It Happen?

Roughly every 5 years — though delays and extensions are common.

Past bills: SAFETEA-LU (2005), MAP-21 (2012), FAST Act (2015), IIJA (2021). Each bill shapes how federal transportation dollars flow for the following half-decade.

03 Who Writes the Bill?

Multiple House and Senate committees with jurisdiction over highways, transit, rail, safety, and finance.

The House T&I Committee leads on highway and transit policy. Revenue/tax provisions go through Ways & Means (House) and Finance (Senate).

WHY IT MATTERS

Reauthorization determines how much federal money flows to our region, which programs we can access, what we can spend it on, and how much flexibility we have in project selection.

The House version of the next surface transportation reauthorization

What Is the BUILD Act?



IIJA* Expires Sept 30, 2026

Congress must pass a new surface transportation bill or an extension.

BUILD Act is the House T&I Committee's proposed reauthorization for next surface bill.

**Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA).*



\$580.9 B Over 5 Years

BUILD Act authorizes **\$580.9B** for FY2027–2031.

This is a **4%** overall increase from the IIJA.

Highway Trust Fund covers **~\$474B**; General Fund covers **~\$107B**.

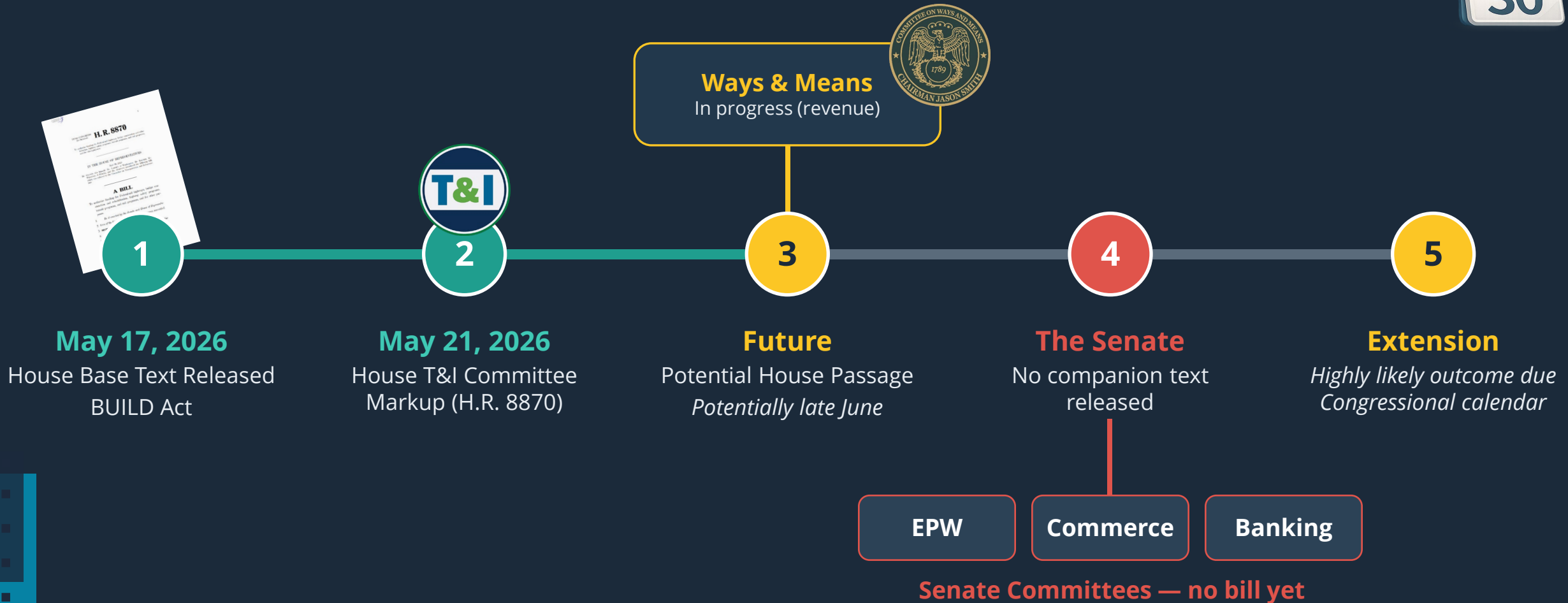


Major Structural Shift

90% of authorized funding is in formula programs. Different approach from IIJA, which had many competitive programs.

Local and regional entities are positioned to receive **~22%** of total federal transportation funding.

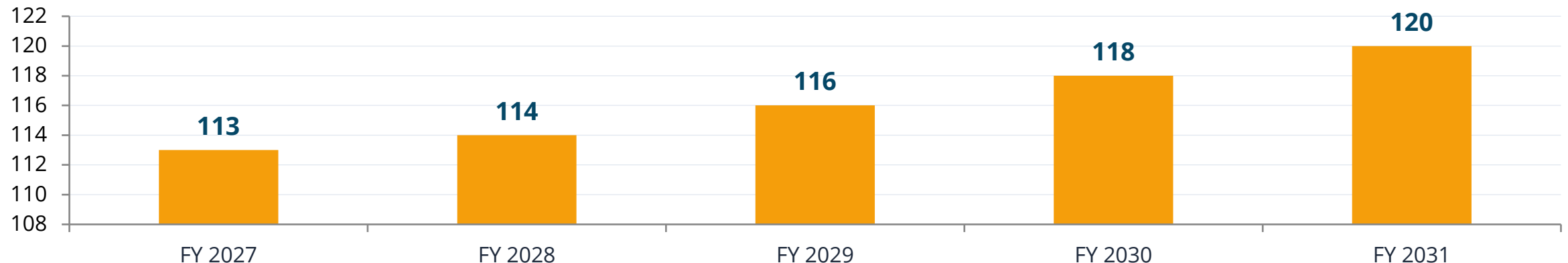

Big Picture: Highway Funds

Paradigm Shift

90% of funding in formula programs

Moves away from competitive grants toward stable formula funding — more predictable for regional planning and programming.

Local & Regional Share

~22% of total federal transportation funding

Local and regional entities access funding through PL, STBG, TAP, SS4A, STAG, Bridge Formula, and CMAQ programs.

MPO Planning (PL) Wins

#1 largest % increase of any formula program

PL grows 9.7% in FY27 (+\$45.8M). New Direct Recipient option, FMIS access, expanded eligibilities, and local match requirement reduced to 10%.

Watch List

 Items to monitor closely

Consolidated Funding Pilot Program gives states a block grant — MPOs must be consulted. CRP eliminated; CMAQ has new alt-fuel set-aside.

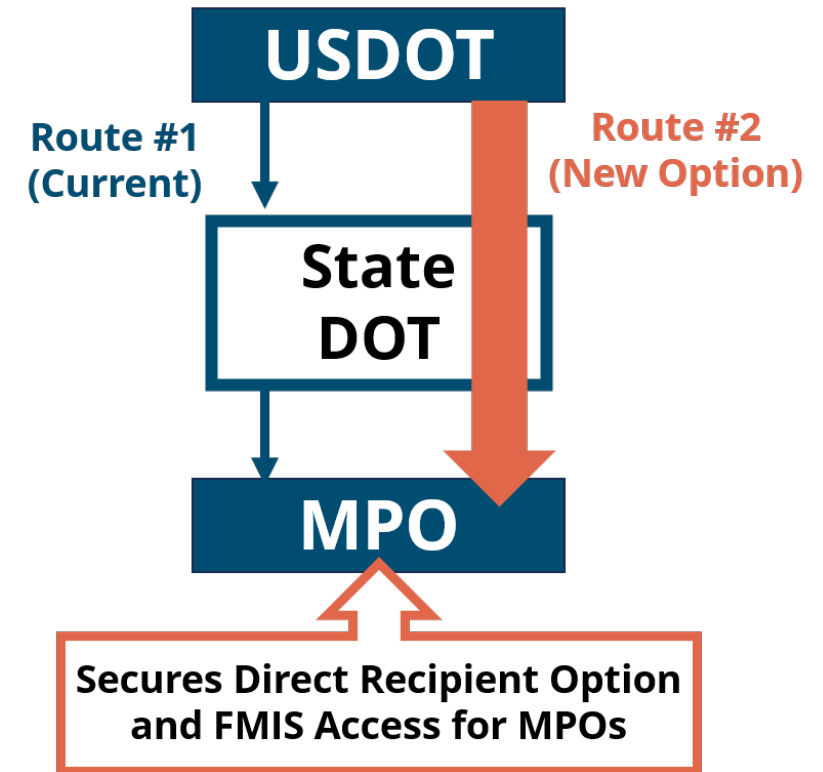
Metropolitan Planning Program (PL Funds)

22.8% Increase
over 5 years

- **Federal Share:** 90/10
- **Expanded Eligibilities**
 - Fiscal administration of local projects
 - Preliminary design
 - Local technical assistance
 - Studies linked to transportation
 - Data procurement
- **Direct Recipient Option**
 - FMIS access for direct recipients



✓ Grows **9.66% FY26 to FY27** (+\$45.8 million)



PL is the largest % increase of any core formula program in the BUILD Act

Funds for Regional & Local Delivery



Bridge Formula Program ~\$9B / yr

20% off-system set-aside plus a **25%** competitive carve-out for locally-owned bridges — **95%** federal match for local/tribal owners.

- MPO consultation role on off-system bridges
- Large MPOs are eligible applicants for competitive bridge program



Safe Streets and Roads for All ~\$500M FY27

~\$3.75B over five years for local safety projects. **90%** federal match; planning grants capped at **5%** of total funds. MPOs eligible.

- FY 28 — **\$625 M**
- FY 29 — **\$750 M**
- FY 30 — **\$875 M**
- FY 31 — **\$1.0 B**



Surface Transportation Accelerator Grant (STAG) ~\$2.4B / yr

Large, new, flexible program with wide eligibility (similar to BUILD/RAISE):

- Local & regional grants: **50%** of funding
- Rural grants: **25%** (\$600 M)
- Urban grants: **25%** (\$600 M)

What to Watch & Next Steps

WATCH CLOSELY

Consolidated Funding Pilot

Up to 10 states receive a lump-sum block grant. MPOs must be consulted on local fund distribution — but consultation ≠ veto.

CRP Eliminated

Carbon Reduction Program ends FY27. Most projects remain eligible under STBG and CMAQ.

CMAQ Alt-Fuel Set-Aside

10% of CMAQ must fund alternative fueling in FY27, declining to 7% by FY30. Could reduce dollars available for regional priorities.

RTPO Funding Not Included in BUILD Act

The Local Officials in Transportation (LOT) Coalition's BASICS Act (H.R. 7437) RTPO proposal (\$150M/yr, 100% federal) was not included in the BUILD Act. The LOT Coalition continues to support its addition in the Senate.

✓ **AMPO's RECOMMENDED ACTIONS**

1 Educate your Congressional Delegation

Educate your delegation on BUILD Act wins including, local safety and bridge funding, increased flexible STBG funding, planning fund improvements, and local match reductions.

2 Build on the Base

The reauthorization process is a long timeline. Continue educating your Delegation on the importance of meaningful support for regions/locals. Flag any concerning elements.

3 Follow the Process

AMPO has lots of resources surrounding national and federal updates on the federal surface transportation reauthorization process. Follow our newsletter and reach out with questions

3 Work with your National Organizations

AMPO as well as the LOT coalition (NLC, NACo, USCM, NADO, NARC, and NADO) have resources to help support local and regional engagement in the reauthorization process.

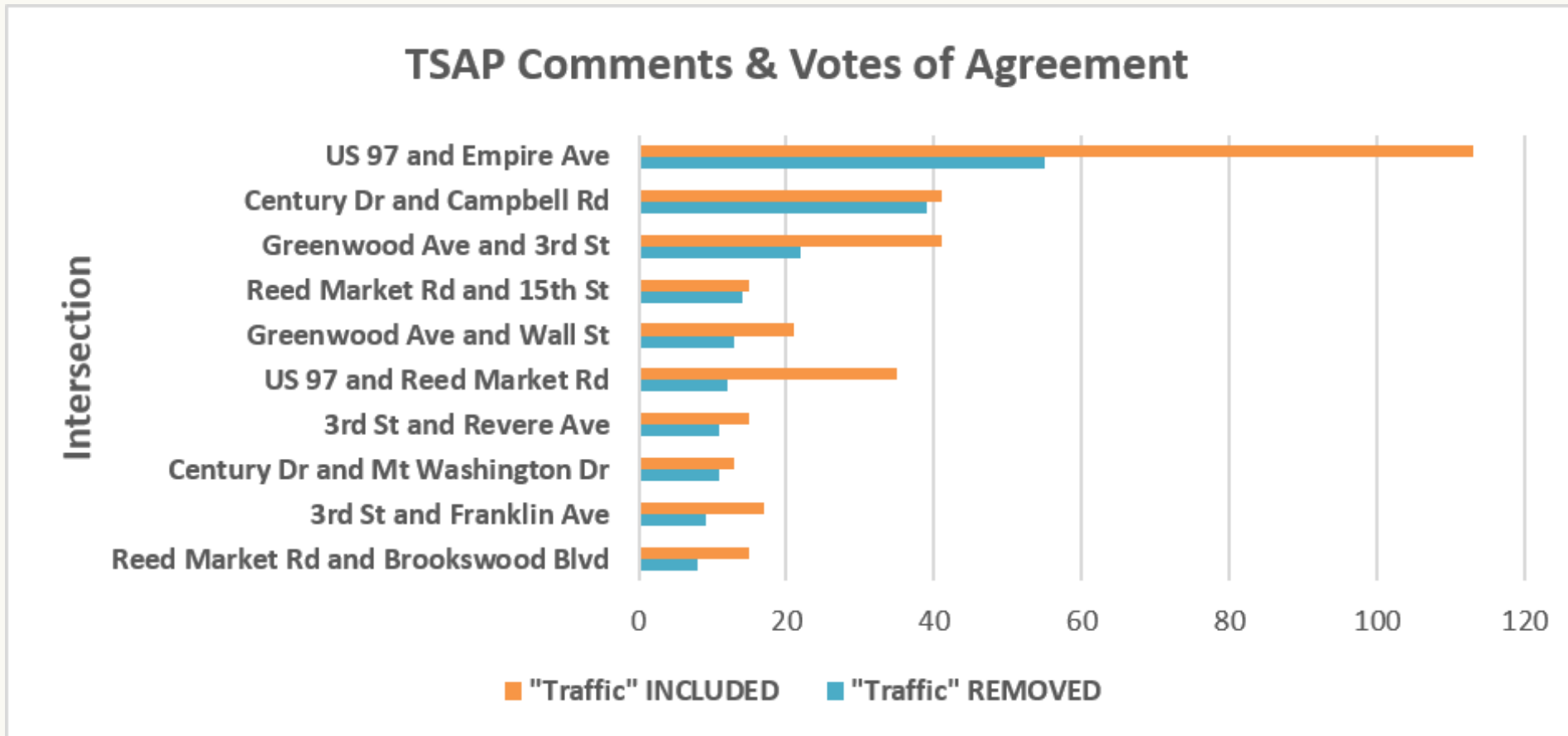
