

TEMPORARY SIGNS, BANNER, PORTABLE

Quick Reference Guide

The Bend Sign Code regulates the number, duration, lighting, size and placement of signs, but not the content. The following temporary signs must be registered and meet the requirements and standards of the Bend Sign Code.

Buried utility lines are everywhere. Call 811 before you dig!

Banner

A banner is composed of flexible material, such as vinyl, fabric, pliable plastic, paper or other lightweight material, and not enclosed in a rigid frame. Banners include signs commonly referred to as "tear drop" or "feather flags" and other similarly defined signs but do not include "flags" as defined in the Bend Sign Code.

Examples of a banner use includes, but is not limited to, advertising the following:

- Grand opening
- Coming soon
- Event



Sign must be non-illuminated.

One banner may be displayed on a site for a maximum of 60 days in a calendar year.

A banner may be up to 60 square feet in area.

Banners attached to a building must be located on or below the first story, and not more than 14 feet above grade. Banners that are freestanding are limited to a maximum height of 8 feet.

Temporary Sign – Development Project


A large temporary sign may be located on a site where a development project has received land use approvals or, if no land use approval is required, a building permit.

Examples of a large temporary sign used for a development project include, but are not limited to, advertising the following:

- Subdivision Development Project
- Commercial Building / Remodel Project

Sign must be non-illuminated.

Lot or parcels less than four acres may display one sign up to 32 square feet in area and eight feet in height.



Lots or parcels over four acres may display a maximum of two signs. Each sign may be up to 64 square feet in area and eight feet in height.

Signs may be installed up to two weeks prior to the start of construction project for which a permit has been issued, and must be removed within seven days after the completion of the development project or within one year of issuance of the sign permit, whichever occurs first.

Portable Sign


Portable signs are movable sign that is not attached to a structure or the ground. Portable signs include A-frame signs, T-frame signs, and similar signs.

Examples of a portable sign use may include, but is not limited to, advertising the following:

- Sale
- Event

Sign must be non-illuminated.

One portable sign may be up to six square feet in area with a maximum height of four feet and a maximum width of two feet.



The portable sign may be displayed on a site for a maximum of 90 days per calendar year.

Not more than two temporary portable sign registrations can be issued per site per year.
