



#### WATER SOURCES AND WATER USE

The City of Bend Utility Department provides water and sewer services to approximately 26,000 customers. Approximately 13,000 customers receive sewer services only. Our water comes from two sources, pristine surface water from the Bend Municipal Watershed and 20 area wells that access the Deschutes aquifer. The majority of water we use on an annual basis (60%) goes to water outdoor landscapes during the summer season. It's during this period (Peak Season Demand) that our surface water must be supplemented with well water to meet the additional demand for landscape watering.

#### PROTECTING WATER RESOURCES

Water is an essential resource to all. Water is also a resource that can be taken for granted. We simply turn on a tap or activate an irrigation cycle, and water magically appears. In Bend, our current price for water is two dollars and sixty-two cents per one thousand gallons. It's safe to say, we are well accustomed to our convenient access to this precious resource. The City



of Bend is committed to managing our award-winning water sustainably and delivering water to our customers at an affordable price. An important piece in accomplishing this is by way of water conservation. Through the process of updating our Water Management Conservation Plan (WMCP), a requirement by the state of Oregon to ensure we are managing water resources sustainably, the Utility Department has quantified conservation as a cost-effective method and integral piece in meeting current and future demand.

### THE WATERWISE PROGRAM

The City of Bend Utility Department's WaterWise program focuses on reducing water waste, increasing water use efficiency, and prolonging our existing water supplies into the future. We offer various programs to help our customers evaluate water use and identify ways to achieve savings. The WaterWise Team offers accredited workshops to green industry professionals and hosts community-based seminars and field day events centered around irrigation efficiency and climate-appropriate landscaping. For larger-scale properties such as parks, schools, and large area commercial properties, we provide water use data, technical assistance, and sprinkler system evaluations to help manage water more efficiently.

## 2021 SPRINKLER INSPECTION PROGRAM RE-CAP

With 147 appointments, the 2021 Sprinkler Inspection Program provided City of Bend customers with a customized irrigation system report containing an optimized watering schedule and tips to improve efficiency. Common landscape recommendations on how to apply water properly and without waste included:



- Raising and leveling sprinkler heads that have tilted or sunken
- · Adjusting sprinklers to avoid overspray and run-off
- Freeing sprinklers of obstruction
- Replacing broken or worn equipment
- Converting to climate-appropriate plantings
- Eliminating mixed sprinkler types that are on the same sprinkler station
- · Adjusting sprinkler controllers in step with seasonal changes in water need.
