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From the Director

We all rely on our transportation system to go about our daily lives. A connected, well-maintained transportation system allows people—and the goods and services we depend on—to move around safely and efficiently.



Bend's transportation system is a public investment that needs regular maintenance to ensure mobility, public safety, economic activity and quality of life. The Streets and Operations Division of the Transportation & Mobility Department focuses on operating and maintaining Bend's transportation system for all users, and that includes more than 900 lane miles, more than 500 sidewalk miles and more than 200 miles of striped, separated and buffered bike lanes (and counting!)

In our rapidly growing community, the cost of maintaining this system has gone up more than the funds available to pay for it. When the City Council adopted a new Transportation Fee in March 2024, part of a multi-faceted transportation funding strategy, it came with a plan to establish an annual report and public-facing data dashboard to illustrate our operations and finances associated with the new revenue. This is the first such report.

This first annual report represents an effort to build public trust through increased transparency and accountability. It will overview some key areas of our services, which will be enhanced by the new Transportation Fee income in the future.

We work to use public funds responsibly, using cost-effective strategies to maintain and preserve roads, sidewalks, bike lanes and more. Thank you for letting us serve your transportation needs.

The Transportation & Mobility Department and the Budget






Transportation Funding

The Streets and Operations Division budget has relied on the State Gas Tax and a small portion of local property taxes to pay for street operations and maintenance. Unfortunately, those funding sources don't meet all our operations and maintenance needs. To help maintain a multi-modal transportation system (i.e., for people who drive, ride bikes, walk or roll), the City Council in 2024 adopted a Transportation Fee, collected from all residents and businesses through the City's utility bill.

The City began collecting Transportation Fees in the summer of 2024. The Phase 1 revenue target is \$5 million in fiscal year 2024-2025, and the Phase 2 revenue target is \$10 million in fiscal year 2025-2026. At the date of this first report, we have only been collecting the fee for a few months.

TRANSPORTATION FEE REVENUE TO DATE



There are currently 329 customers benefitting from Transportation Fee discounts through the **Low Income Assistance Program**.



Transportation Fee revenues are used for operations and maintenance of the City's transportation system. This includes pavement restoration, street preservation, signs, striping, sidewalk and other concrete work, bicycle and multi-modal system enhancement, street sweeping and cleaning, winter operations such as snow removal. We are growing programs that will focus on safety improvements and street connectivity for all users and modes of travel on our transportation system.








Street Preservation

The City uses cost-effective strategies to extend the life of our streets and to help community members get where they want to go. With the Transportation Fee, you'll see fewer potholes and smoother pavement.

BEND'S PAVEMENT CONDITIONS INDEX



Overall street conditions are rated using a "Pavement Condition Index," with 100 being an "excellent" road condition, 75–85 being "good." 57 and under means the street is "poor," and 39 and under suggests a "failed" street.




Winter Operations


Service Requests

Bend Works for you! We rely on community input about where you see potholes, flooding, damaged signs and so much more. Most of our service requests are related to problems brought on by winter weather, but we also field a lot of requests for sweeping, potholes, graffiti and more. Transportation & Mobility Department staff have received 1,153 Bend Works service requests so far this year!

Bike and Pedestrian Improvements



The City is working to make it safer and more pleasant for people who walk, ride bikes or roll. We are building missing sections of sidewalks, enhancing and improving safe crossings, ADA ramps and buffered bike lanes on key traveling routes.

With the Transportation Fee, we'll be able to do more frequent sweeping, plowing, and striping on priority routes, including streets, bike lanes, (including buffered bike lanes,) roundabouts, bridges and key

cycling routes.



Linear feet of bike lanes installed annually:






Sweeping

Sweeping removes dirt and debris from streets to provide safer conditions for all methods of travel, and to create a healthy and attractive environment. Sweeping also removes leaves and debris that could otherwise clog storm drains and exacerbate flooding.

Transportation Engineering

The Transportation Engineering program manages traffic signals, bridges, streetlighting, neighborhood street safety, service requests, and muti-modal programs. With the Transportation Fee, more of these types of projects will be feasible.



SPEED RADAR PROGRAM

Each summer, the Neighborhood Speed Radar Program deploys speed radars to remind drivers to follow speed limits. These radars can also collect data about how fast people are driving in certain locations.

Percent Roads where 85% Travel Speed is Less than Posted Speed Limit


Percent Roads where 85% Travel Speed is Greater than Posted Speed Limit
