Subject: Privately Owned Residential Area - Nottingham Square Path Proposal

Dear Community Leaders,

Please consider that Nottingham Square is a privately owned and maintained property. Although it was annexed into the city, we have private roads and signs marked for owners and guests only.

When my fiancée purchased the home in 2002, one of the most attractive qualities was not the actual home, but the **neighborhood**. I am disabled and spend most of my time home alone. Signs were posted at the entrances stating "No Solicitors". Previous to purchasing in NS, we rented on Forest Grove in the Old Mill vicinity and we frequently had door to door solicitors which was annoying and disruptive to me taking care of my health needs (my health issues affect my sleep). Finding this unique neighborhood (owners and guests only) felt like moving into a small town within a city. It is quiet, friendly, neighbors look out for one another - it is a community with many of the positive attributes of a small town. Knowing our neighbors and residents provides a sense of safety. By opening to the public and making it a thorough-fare of sorts, this will increase the volume of people. This will very likely increase littering, noise, vandalism, breaks-in and plethora of problems.

Throughout the years as the city has grown and development has occurred to the north and south of us, we have dealt with more noise and resulting traffic on 15th and trespassers on the property, particularly on the canal road and this has created issues. We may not be able to change the increase of traffic on 15th, but we should be able to have the city recognize and respect the annex agreement that will allow us to continue to function as a private community that we bought into.

There are alternate possibilities for having bike paths, crosswalks, and sidewalks along 15th which is **very much needed**. Please focus attention and invest our tax dollars on making 15th street safer for current and future use and not on making changes that will have a negative impact on our private community.

Additionally, we would like to add the attachment written by Dave Kyle of Nottingham Square Long- Term Planning Committee and state that we agree with and endorse his proposal.

Public Comment for CTAC

Re: Key Routes for bikes and pedestrians

City staff has produced a map showing a key route bisecting a private neighborhood. Nottingham Square HOA is located in SE Bend; south of Reed Market and between SE 15th and the railroad track.

Nottingham was started in 1973 and annexed into Bend in 1998. The city gave Nottingham the choice of retaining private roads and we continue to pay for our own private road system which includes the Canal Road which is a COID easement on the land we own. We have blocked other public access roads from being connected to the Nottingham road system. We largely have no fences. We have no sidewalks. Our roads are posted at 15 MPH. We have many of the low stress attributes that the advisory committee seeks for the rest of Bend.

Although the road system and specifically the Canal Road is posted as private, no trespassing, we have experienced increasing pressure from trespassers. This is due in large part because the city has failed to provide safe low stress sidewalks and crossings along SE 15th street. Faced with increased Canal Road trespass including cars, all-terrain vehicles, bikes, pedestrians and off lease dogs and the resulting damage to the Canal Road, which also serves as a dike against the flooding of lower grade homes, we have gated the Canal Road.


A stated goal from the public input workshops is a limit on through traffic. This, I believe, also applies to bike and foot traffic, not just cars. Now planning shows public access through Nottingham (see page 19 of the Meeting #9 agenda). The resulting through traffic and needed fencing will change the very open nature of our neighborhood. It is also difficult to fully anticipate the impact of traffic volume, potential lighting, electric bike speeds, winter plowing and right of way at the car and foot bridges.

Last year I provided a map of other route options including along SE 15th. Despite these options, staff has elected to show the Key Route as passing through the middle of Nottingham. Hopefully, this was an oversight or misunderstanding. By showing this route on public maps you are further encouraging trespass. Doesn't it make sense to address the root cause of safety/stress issues along SE15th. After all, because of planned schools, city code requires proper sidewalks and crossings along this portion of SE 15th. The Key Route should be shown as being along SE 15th.

Finally, shouldn't the city honor its 1998 commitment to recognize Nottingham's private road, low stress, no through traffic neighborhood?

I have lived in the Nottingham Square neighborhood for several years. My property backs up to the canal trail, which I continue to thoroughly enjoy every day. As I sit here writing this letter, I can see two geese wandering down from the trail, which I'm not going to bring to my little dog's attention because he loves to bark and run after them, his tail wagging happily back and forth. He also likes to bark at the many deer who frequent my front and back yards before moving on to the canal trail and beyond. Many residents of Nottingham Square continue to enjoy access to this quiet, private trail for walks with family, their dogs, or individual times of reflection. I see a lot of baby strollers going by as more young families move into this lovely neighborhood.

The canal trail through Nottingham Square covers a relatively short distance. As part of a proposed bike trail, this distance could instead be easily accommodated along SE 15th Street as part of a multi-use path and where public right-of-way already exists. A key bike route along the canal trail would affect the privacy of my property as well as the property values of places such as mine that back up to the canal trail. It could also bring into question security concerns, since the Nottingham Square Homeowners Association prohibits fencing around properties in order for lawns to be mowed on a continuous basis. (Which I pay hefty monthly dues for, as well.)



Dear Karen Swirsky,

My husband and I have lived in the Nottingham Square subdivision since 1993. When we moved here the subdivision wasn't even in the city limits. We voted against inclusion but our 163 homeowners were small compared to the rest of the residents of Bend. When we were annexed to the city of Bend we were given the option to keep our subdivision private in exchange for taking care of our own road maintenance. Now we are hearing rumors that our privacy may be violated in a most unattractive way.

Part of the beauty of this modest subdivision is the fact no perimeter fencing is allowed around our homes. This could turn out to be a terrible liability if the public is allowed to walk and ride their bicycles right down the canal that intersects our property. We are already experiencing an influx of residents from The Bridges who think our subdivision is a park. They stroll along our streets as well as along the canal bank, cutting across yards whenever they wish since there are no fences. Many do not keep their dogs on leashes or pick up after their pets. We are hoping this will end when the park being planned further south on 15th is completed.

My husband and I are asking you to support us and our neighbors, many of us senior citizens, at Tuesday's CTAC meeting and agree to a trail along 15th, not through our subdivision.

Subject: Key routes for bikes and pedestrians

Dear Karen Swirsky and Mayor Sally Russell,
Please share this with the CTAC and the members of the Bend City Council.

We are homeowners in Nottingham Square, an HOA located in SE Bend, south of Reed Market and between SE 15th and the railroad track. All of the land within Nottingham has been owned solely by the HOA for 46 years since 1973. Please read carefully the attached excellent public comment for CTAC by Dave Kyle, the chairman of the Nottingham long-range planning committee. Also attached is the map produced by city staff to which he is referring. It was on page 19 of the agenda for the CTAC meeting #9, posted to the public online.

We agree with everything Dave said. The city's map shows that CTAC and the city are planning and publicly advertising a key route through our privately owned property, which is illegal. It also publicly promotes trespassing. As he explained, Nottingham was annexed into the city in 1998. At that time the city gave us the choice of retaining ownership of our private roads, which we did. We pay for all the repairs, maintenance, snow removal, etc. Our roads include the canal road which has a COID maintenance easement on the land we own. We have successfully blocked other public access roads from being connected to the Nottingham road system. Nottingham has kept its commitment, and the city must keep its commitment. Due to large amounts of trespassing by cars, bikes, pedestrians and off leash dogs, we have had to post signs at our entrances, roads, and at the gates on the canal as private property, no trespassing.

The city needs to quickly complete its responsibility to finish the sidewalks down both sides of SE 15th from where they presently end to Knott Road. The Larkspur Lane trail needs to be completed from where it presently ends the rest of the way on the east side of SE 15th to Knott Road. There already exists public right-of-way for almost the entire length of it to allow for the completion of sidewalks, bike lanes, or multi use paths of both sides of the street. The volume of traffic on it has become huge, fast, loud, and dangerous for cars, bikes, pedestrians, and especially for the elderly and the handicapped. It is only going to become much worse with the addition of the 2 schools, the Larkspur Recreation Center, the 37 acre Alpenglow Community Park, the hundreds of additional homes and apartments on both sides of the street, and the east-west Murphy Road extension. Public safety demands that the key route for bikes, pedestrians, and the handicapped be quickly provided down both sides of SE 15th before a serious tragedy and costly lawsuits occur. Please be aware that the vast majority of it has no handicapped access, and there is not even one safe place for the handicapped to cross it from Highway 20 to Knott Road. With reduced speed for schools at both ends of the street, there should be a uniform, low stress speed between Highway 20 and Knott.

We would like you to be aware of some additional reasons why Nottingham prohibits public access to our canal road. We are extremely vulnerable to fire. All the families in the 163 homes

from both sides of the canal have to exit through the 2 entrances onto SE 15th. The fire on Pilot Butte that was deliberately set last year on the Fourth of July caused the evacuation, and near destruction of the many homes adjacent to it. The Pilot Butte Nursing Home was also endangered. The fire jumped over Highway 20 and caused power outage even in Nottingham several miles to the south. The Columbia Gorge fire, which was also deliberately set, burned a vast amount of land and jumped the entire Columbia River from Oregon to Washington. The smoke from it caused very serious problems even in Bend. The Aubrey Hall fire jumped the Deschutes River and burned homes on both sides of it. If we were to allow public access to our canal road, it would not be a question of if there would be a fire, but rather how often. Many of our residents are elderly or handicapped, and would simply be burned alive. We cannot have countless people going through us smoking cigarettes and pot, flicking their ashes into the dry grass, using legal and illegal fireworks, making campfires, etc.

In addition to the fire danger, the peace, quiet, privacy, and safety of our residents would be destroyed. We recently had to install a gate on the south end of our canal road to prevent public trespassing. Shortly after that, a group of people with off leash dogs came up to the gate from the south side. An 82-year-old Nottingham homeowner happened to be walking nearby. One man in the group told him "This gate is not very neighborly." He then used obscene language and told him, "I've got 2 sons who will take care of you!" (Apparently he considers that to be neighborly.) One woman in the group climbed over the fence into Nottingham. We do not want the entire world not only allowed, but also encouraged, to go very close to our homes and children 24/7, 365. Last summer human feces was found on the canal road. We do not want any irritated persons or drug users filming us with their phones to plan how to rob and vandalize. Our CC&R's do not permit fences in Nottingham. We do not want any fences along the canal road.

We urge you to immediately change the key route to SE 15th and show that in all your online info. Please also expedite the safety requirements to SE 15th described above. We hope to find that the members of the CTAC and of the City Council are law-abiding, responsible persons. Please do not make choices that would waste city taxpayers' money on legal fees to defend the city from this planned illegal action. Thank you for your many hours of hard work.

Subject: Pedestrial and bike trail

I've lived in the Nottingham Square community for 25 years, and I am also a Board member in Nottingham. Also, as a real estate appraiser, I am concerned with how changes to Nottingham affect property values.

As a member of the greater community of Bend, I welcome changes that will enhance our city. Although many of us don't like change, we know that it is often necessary. Numerous developments have been built around or near Nottingham Square in the past 25 years, and this growth continues. A recent April, 2019 article in The Bulletin stated that Pahlisch Homes plans to build town houses on 120 lots in Luderman Crossing, just to the north of Nottingham. While such development is necessary to meet Bend's current and future population needs, it is wrong to knowingly or carelessly take away rights from a private community that has been in place for over 40 years. In the quest to create affordable housing, it's important that developers and public entities remember that their decisions have repercussions for all their citizens, both positive and negative, and including those of us in small communities like Nottingham. The canal road inside Nottingham is private property, that has a COID easement. Daily walks in Nottingham used to be quiet and rejuvenating, but as the newer communities appear, Nottingham has more and more foot and bicycle traffic from those who do not live here, and some who do not respect the no trespassing signs. This will only increase if the canal trail becomes a key bike route, and will create more conflicts.

I am in favor of the CTAC proposed alteration of a short segment of Key Route #1. The alteration would take the multi-use trail along 15th Street, and will be a more direct route than the canal easement for those who want or need to access present and future parks and schools being built along 15th Street, south of Nottingham. I feel this would be a safer, more direct route, and would help to maintain privacy for Nottingham residents.

Below is a copy of the email sent out by the long range planning committee for the HOA:

Hi there -

The long range planning committee has used us to share this information with the community.

As part of a revision of the Bend Transportation Plan, an advisory committee (Citywide Transportation Advisory Committee) is working on recommendations. This process is in the 2nd year. Currently they are preparing to vote on May 22 about the Key Routes for Bikes and Pedestrians. Despite efforts to show a better key route along SE 15th, the staff generated map shows a key route bisecting the private road system in Nottingham Square HOA by using the canal road.

The bike coalition is very organized and many members of the advisory committee belong to biking organizations. Also, Parks and Recreation has multiple people, like a board member and a budget committee member, on the advisory committee. On the morning of the May 22 advisory meeting, Sally Russell, the mayor, is a speaker at the Central Oregon Bicycle and Pedestrian Summit 2019 that is being held at the Bend Park and Rec District Office.

A yes vote by the advisory committee results in a recommendation to the city council. Even if the city passes the recommendation, it does not mean it will happen but it is certainly more likely to happen. Ultimately our recourse will be with the city.

*All of that being said, now is the time to make opinions known.
SE 15th should be the Key Route for pedestrians and bikes because:*

1. *SE 15th is the most direct route for pedestrians and bikes from Pilot Butte to Knott Rd. There will be three major parks (four with Pilot Butte), one minor Pahlisch park, and three schools along the route.*
2. *SE 15th directly connects with primary east/west key routes; Franklin, Wilson, Reed Market and Murphy. East of Third street, no other north/south street directly connects or is planned to connect with all of these streets. It also connects with the pedestrian underpass at Highway 20.*
3. *There is existing public right-of-way for almost the entire length of SE 15th to allow for the completion of sidewalks or multi-use paths on both sides of the street. South of Reed Market, city code requires sidewalks and crosswalks because it is within 1 1/2 miles of the new schools. The city already plans to extend the sidewalk on the west side of SE 15th from Nottingham to the canal in September.*
4. *With reduced speed for schools at both ends of SE 15th, it does not make sense to increase the speed in the middle. There should be a uniform, low-stress speed between Highway 20 and Knott. Everyone--cars, pedestrians and bikes--are better off with a uniform low-stress speed.*
Harm to Nottingham HOA

1. Nottingham was started in 1973 and annexed into Bend in 1998. The city gave Nottingham the choice of retaining private roads if the HOA continued to pay for our own private road system. The canal road is part of that non-public access road system but is maintained by COID using an easement. We have successfully blocked other public access roads from being connected to the Nottingham road system. The HOA has kept its commitment and the city must keep its commitment.

2. According to our CC&R's, no fences are allowed in Nottingham. We largely have no fences. We have no sidewalks. Our roads are posted at 15 MPH and are barely wide enough for two cars to pass. Public access on the canal road would seriously undermine our ability to maintain many of the low stress attributes that the advisory committee seeks for the rest of Bend and which Nottingham Square homeowners now enjoy and which they expected to maintain upon purchasing homes in this community.

3. "No trespass" signs are posted at both ends of Nottingham as well as at the railroad crossing at the north end of the canal route and the canal road itself is gated. The entire HOA is posted private. The inclusion of the Nottingham section of the canal road on a proposed Key Route map would promote trespass on HOA property.

As a Bend resident and Nottingham Square homeowner I am deeply concerned over the pending proposal of the NSHOA ditch road inclusion in the parks and rec trail plan. Two of my neighbors Judy Hotchkiss and David Kyle have written superb letters outlining the hazards creating public access through the private community of Nottingham Square, I fully support their statements.

But...I'm very curious why this path is even considered since it's risky for all involved? How about the city consider revamping SE 15th St as a "complete street", recently implemented on some NW Bend streets outlined in Bend Bulletin article dated 4/4/2019? Wouldn't this option serve many more residents of SE Bend? Ms. Swirsky herself was quoted "*Neighborhood greenways are very inexpensive," Swirsky said. "Most of the time, they're just paint.*" Perhaps, SE 15th St., Reed Mkt, Wilson, Bear Creek, Franklin, Ferguson and Murphy Rd. could be restriped as "complete streets" along with lowering vehicle speeds to 25 MPH. If cyclists want a less crowded solution for the 15th St corridor then how about completing the Larkspur trail through the Desert Woods and Kings Forest neighborhoods to Ferguson since they are comprised of public streets?

Let's also not lose sight of the cost to the city and the homeowners of NSHOA this proposed plan isn't cost effective in the long run for either party. The city would better serve Bend residents spending tax dollars improving handicapped accessibility on SE Bend streets.

Many homeowners in Nottingham will not write to oppose this inclusion of the ditch riders road in the trail plan even though they oppose the plan. All

I have talked too feel like they've taken a punch to the gut with this news. The vast majority of our homeowners are over 60 years old (75%) with many of those over 80.

Key Route #1 Feedback.

I am a resident of Nottingham Square and a member of the Bend community at large. I commute by bike and on foot whenever possible. I am married and my spouse walks to work every day via the COID trail from our neighborhood to his business on American Way. My son rides his bike to Bear Creek School on 15th street and will ride his bike to High Desert Middle School next year, and to the new high school when that time comes.

Nottingham residents were notified by email yesterday from our HOA Management Company about the Key Route #1 change to go all the way to the Reed Market round about and south down 15th, and I have concerns.

1. I support a sidewalk down 15th Street to accommodate pedestrians from Reed Market all the way to Knott Road allowing access to the new Alpenglow Park and the new schools. This should be standard in any city to promote alternative transportation methods. Bend is growing rapidly and I believe every option should be considered to get people out of cars and into the

community if possible. We all know traffic is getting considerably worse, particularly at the round about at Reed Market and 15th St. The addition of a new neighborhood to our north, a park, and two schools to our south, traffic will be significantly worse in the coming months and years. Turning left onto 15th street with increased traffic from the new neighborhoods, schools, and parks will become virtually impossible, and adding a multi-use path into that mix seems dangerous to me. So that leads me to #2.

2. I also support the optional trail through Nottingham Square. I understand there are people in our neighborhood that are adamantly opposed to opening access to the COID trail for people outside of our community. This contingent of our neighborhood is vocal and active. However, an equal share of the community believe a trail through our neighborhood would be a valuable addition and provide welcome access to the new park and schools for residents and other community members at large. Further, I firmly believe the original Key Route #1 is the safest route for travel in this area of the city for the following reasons:
 - a. The redrawn option of going to Reed Market and down 15th would put the multi-user path going across multiple neighborhoods and access points to 15th, putting the city under pressure to establish safer cross walks for these pedestrians. Being a long time bicyclist, I can attest that the scariest thing is crossing an entrance to a neighborhood on a sidewalk. Drivers are not trained to watch for that and could easily be looking out onto 15th and simply overlook a child on a bicycle on a sidewalk coming their way.
 - b. I am not sure which side of 15th the CTAC is considering for this multi-use trail, but I would assume it is the East side of 15th as there is available space that could be utilized? Again, I feel like this is a viable option for a sidewalk, but you must consider, the Route #1 is intended to connect West Bend to East Bend via trail. So if you are coming from the West and you have to cross 15th via the cross walk at a very busy two lane round about just to cross back over 15th further down by the park/school, there will be inevitable issues with traffic and accidents. Please note this is a dangerous alternative in my opinion.
 - c. If, however, you are opting to go down the West side of 15th St, again, the trail will cross multiple neighborhood access points, creating hazards for both drivers and pedestrians. The Nottingham neighborhood will again cause stress for the city as it will have to encroach on our property to widen this multi-use trail option all the way down to Knott Road. This is an option, but it is not "safer" for younger pedestrians. There is already a bike lane on Reed Market Road and 15th, so the multi-use trail would only be a safer option for walkers. Experienced cyclists will stay on the road at higher speeds. Less experienced will stay on the path, and again, I feel like the neighborhood entrances would be problematic for a child on a bicycle headed to school. I also think a child riding on 15th street with traffic (especially high school drivers and construction vehicles) is a disaster waiting to happen. Please don't do that!!

As the CTAC, coming up with a viable plan to present to the city is a daunting task. There are many things to consider. Completely dissolving the original plan due to the complaints of some, does not seem to be appropriate. I believe your job on this committee is to come up with good, safe, viable options to create an inclusive, connected community. I do not believe this has to be

an either or scenario. I think it needs to be an inclusive situation and you should submit both plans to the city.

I hear “well, our plan won’t affect the park plan”. But, the city and the parks should be working together. It is all of our taxpayer dollars. I am leary of the lack of communication and lack of cooperation between the agencies. I love Bend, I love our Parks and think that is the best part of this city, but you have to work hand in hand to come up with plans to move our city forward with an overreaching plan.

SE 15th should be the Key Route for pedestrians and bikes because:

1. SE 15th is the most direct route for pedestrians and bikes from Pilot Butte to Knott Rd. There will be three major parks (four with Pilot Butte), one minor Pahlisch park, and three schools along the route.
2. SE 15th directly connects with primary east/west key routes; Franklin, Wilson, Reed Market and Murphy. East of Third street, no other north/south street directly connects or is planned to connect with all of these streets. It also connects with the pedestrian underpass at Highway 20.
3. There is existing public right-of-way for almost the entire length of SE 15th to allow for the completion of sidewalks or multi-use paths on both sides of the street. South of Reed Market, city code requires sidewalks and crosswalks because it is within 1 1/2 miles of the new schools. The city already plans to extend the sidewalk on the west side of SE 15th from Nottingham to the canal in September.
4. With reduced speed for schools at both ends of SE 15th, it does not make sense to increase the speed in the middle. There should be a uniform, low-stress speed between Highway 20 and Knott. Everyone--cars, pedestrians and bikes--are better off with a uniform low-stress speed.

Harm to Nottingham HOA

1. Nottingham was started in 1973 and annexed into Bend in 1998. The city gave Nottingham the choice of retaining private roads if the HOA continued to pay for our own private road system. The canal road is part of that non-public access road system but is maintained by COID using an easement. We have successfully blocked other public access roads from being connected to the Nottingham road system. The HOA has kept its commitment and the city must keep its commitment.
2. According to our CC&R's, no fences are allowed in Nottingham. We largely have no fences. We have no sidewalks. Our roads are posted at 15 MPH and are barely wide enough for two cars to pass. Public access on the canal road would seriously undermine our ability to maintain many of the low stress attributes that the advisory committee seeks for the rest of Bend and which Nottingham Square homeowners now enjoy and which they expected to maintain upon purchasing homes in this community.
3. "No trespass" signs are posted at both ends of Nottingham as well as at the railroad crossing at the north end of the canal route and the canal road itself is gated. The entire HOA is posted private. The inclusion of the Nottingham section of the canal road on a proposed Key Route map would promote trespass on HOA property.

For the last year and even prior to that, Nottingham has been in discussions with Park and Rec concerning the use of the canal road as part of the Park and Rec trail system. The Nottingham board and the Long Range Planning Committee met with Park and Rec a number of times, and gained the knowledge to make a decision based on what is known now about development, 15th street, etc.

Park and Rec was clear that, as it was private property, it was our decision, and that they would not use eminent domain.
