League of Oregon Cities Bulletin

- The 2026 legislative session kicks off Monday. Lawmakers will grapple with budget shortfalls, transportation funding challenges, and a wide range of issues affecting cities, including land use, water, public safety and energy.

Regional Partners Come Together on Housing and Homelessness

On January 26, the Central Oregon Regional Housing Council (RHC) and Deschutes County's Coordinated Houseless Response Office (CHRO) held a joint work session at Redmond City Hall to explore what is needed to effectively address the region's shared housing and homelessness challenges. The discussion generated helpful insights to inform the next phase of regional planning. Review the [PowerPoint presentation](#) from the meeting.

Attendees of the meeting recommended a May 2024 presentation, *Building a Better Bend: Homelessness is a Housing Problem*, by Dr. Gregg Colburn, Associate Professor in the Runstad Department of Real Estate in the College of Built Environments at the University of Washington. The Central Oregon Regional Housing Council is a regional body convened by the Central Oregon Intergovernmental Council (COIC) to support coordination among cities, counties, tribes, and community partners. It advances shared learning, priorities, and advocacy and provides unified feedback to state agencies.

Bend Municipal Airport News

Highlights from the [February 2026 Airport Newsletter](#) include:

- The Airfield Lighting Project enters Phase 2 of 5, with the full project expected to continue through May 2026. This project will enhance safety and operational efficiency for all users at Bend Municipal Airport.
 - The Taxilane Pavement Rehabilitation Project is scheduled to begin on March 30, 2026. The purpose of this project is to address pavement failures, surface dips, and drainage issues. Work will be completed in three phases, weather permitting, over an estimated three-month period.
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Microtransit Solutions: Lessons from Sioux Falls

On January 23, Mobility Programs Manager Derek Hofbauer, along with other staff, attended a Via Transportation webinar titled *Rethinking Transit in America's Fastest-Growing Cities: Lessons from Sioux Falls*.



Councilors are invited to view the **webinar**, which includes insights from the Mayor of Sioux Falls, South Dakota. Faced with population growth, low fixed-route bus ridership, and high operating costs, the City reevaluated its approach and transitioned from a traditional fixed-route bus network to one that added an on-demand microtransit service model.

By adopting microtransit in addition to modernizing existing routes, Sioux Falls was able to increase ridership, reduce cost per trip, improve travel times, and significantly expand geographic coverage from 60 percent to 100 percent of the city. The microtransit system uses smaller vehicles, such as vans, allowing service to reach the entire city.

Neighborhood Street Safety Program Update

The Neighborhood Street Safety Program (NSSP) was initiated in 2020 as part of the City's ongoing effort to improve safety, livability, and comfort on neighborhood streets. The program focuses on low-cost, high-impact safety improvements intended to reduce vehicle speeds, improve visibility, and support walking, biking, and rolling, while maintaining neighborhood access and emergency response needs.


Since its launch, the City has completed 28 Neighborhood Street Safety Program (NSSP) projects, with an additional 16 projects scheduled for completion by the end of 2028. These projects represent incremental, citywide investments focused on improving safety at the neighborhood scale.

Program Status

- Program criteria and prioritization methods have been refined using a combination of data, including crash history, vehicle speeds, traffic volumes, along with community-identified concerns.
- Projects continue to advance through concept development, preliminary design, and implementation, with an emphasis on quick-build and scalable treatments.
- Ongoing coordination is occurring with Operations, Police, Fire, and utility partners to ensure proposed designs are operationally feasible, maintainable, and compatible with emergency access requirements.
- Community input gathered from neighborhood associations, service requests, and prior outreach efforts continues to shape project selection and design.

Typical NSSP Improvements

Neighborhood Street Safety Program projects may include traffic calming and safety measures such as:

- Speed management treatments (e.g., speed humps, curb extensions, chicanes)
 - Intersection visibility and pedestrian crossing enhancements
 - Signing, striping, and pavement markings
 - Minor geometric adjustments to reinforce lower operating speeds

DEIA Advisory Committee Quarterly Meeting Highlights

On January 23, the City of Bend's internal DEIA Advisory Committee held its quarterly meeting.
