



# 2026 Q2 QUARTERLY REPORT



## From the Chief

Summer has arrived in beautiful Central Oregon, and for the Bend Police Department, that means a marked increase in calls for service as tourists arrive and more people are visiting our community.

We often see a particular increase in people driving under the influence, traffic complaints, motor vehicle crashes and disputes in the downtown core. Those are not just driven by visitors to our community, so we'd like to remind residents to plan ahead to minimize DUII drivers on our streets.

We know this time of year can be frustrating for residents. Remember to give yourself a little more time on our congested roads, be patient with people who may not know where they are going, and to be a good example by following our local laws to keep everyone safe.

At the end of May, the Bend Police Department began issuing citations at three intersections that are now equipped with automated traffic enforcement cameras. Between April 23 and May 18, our agency issued 1,164 warnings to members of the public who either ran a red light or sped through one of the intersections featured in this program. Of those 1,164 warnings, 358 were for speeding and 806 were for running a red light.

From here on out, if you run a red light or speed through those intersections you'll receive a ticket in the mail. Please remember that in order to legally turn right on red, you must first come to a complete stop behind the white line.

And finally, a quick reminder that the City of Bend does not allow fireworks in our city. Aerial fireworks have long been illegal throughout Oregon, because they are dangerous and put our very dry community at risk. The fireworks ban also applies to fireworks that are legal in other parts of Oregon, like those that stay close to the ground. We know people want to celebrate, but we ask you to do it safely and legally. That means watching the official fireworks show over Pilot Butte instead of putting our community in danger by lighting off illegal fireworks.



# E-Motorcycles



**Is that an e-bike or an e-motorcycle?**



**E-motorcycles can be dangerous. Many are also illegal.**

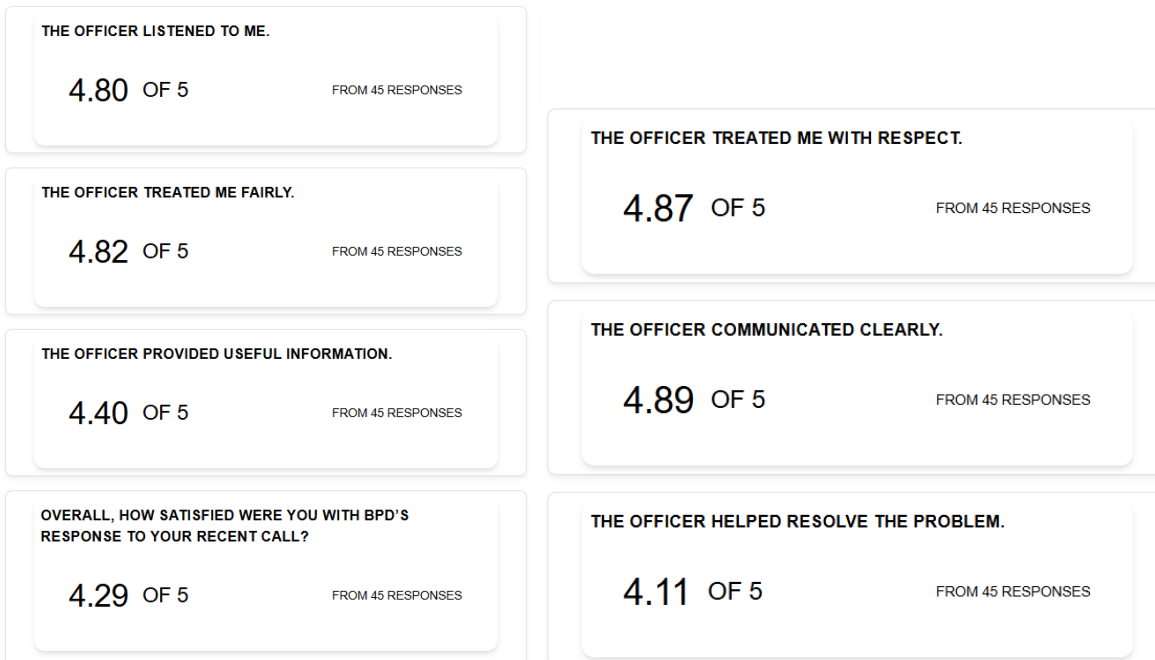


Our patrol and traffic teams are seeing an increase in illegal electric dirt bikes and electric motorcycles being ridden around town, including by children. We want to ask our community to know the law and make sure you're not putting yourself or your children in danger by purchasing something that cannot be legally ridden on our roads.

- If what you are riding can travel at speeds above 28 MPH without pedaling, it is no longer an e-bike - it's an e-motorcycle.
- Off-road electric motorcycles that cannot be registered are not legal on city streets, sidewalks or trails in city limits.
- Do your research. Please do not buy or use something that is not legal on our streets. If you are caught riding one of these vehicles on our city streets, you could face a fine of \$265.

## Top Offense Counts by Crime Category

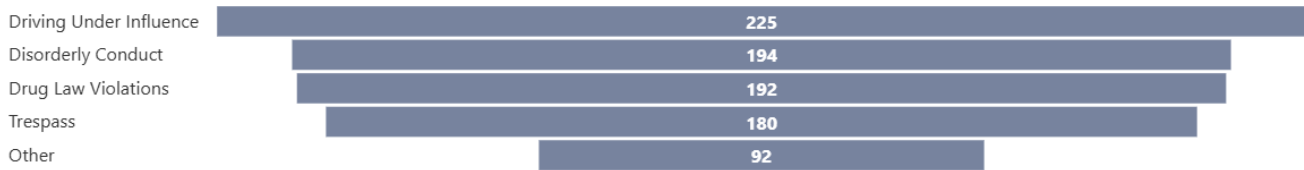

### Crimes Against Society

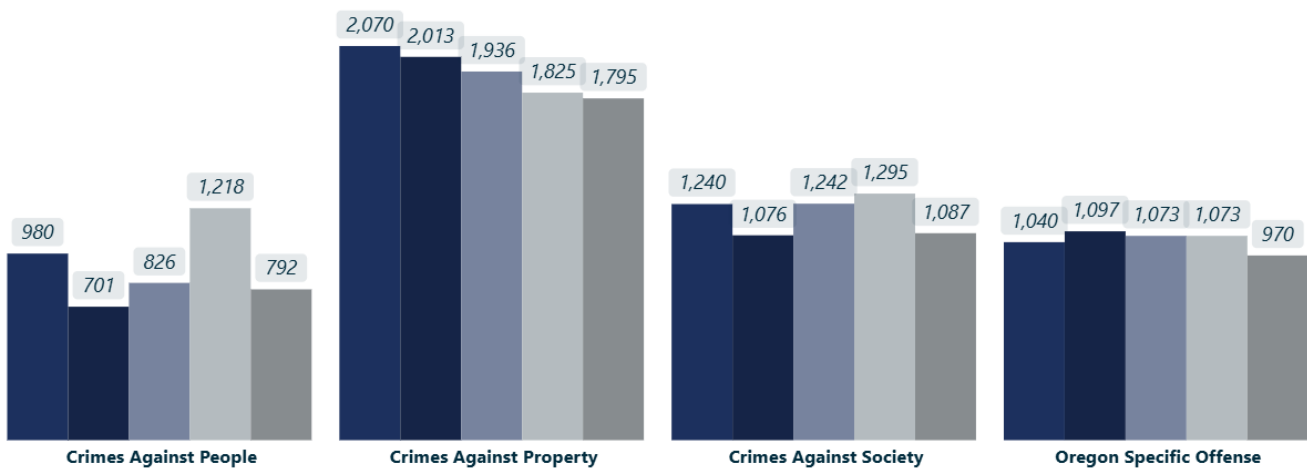


### Oregon Specific Offense

● 2022 ● 2023 ● 2024 ● 2025 ● 2026

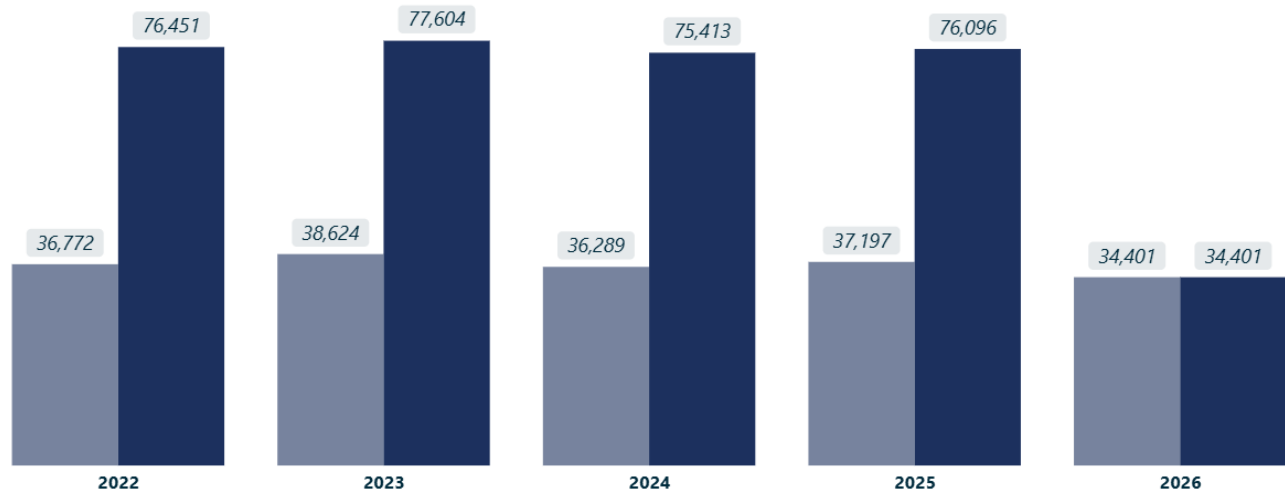

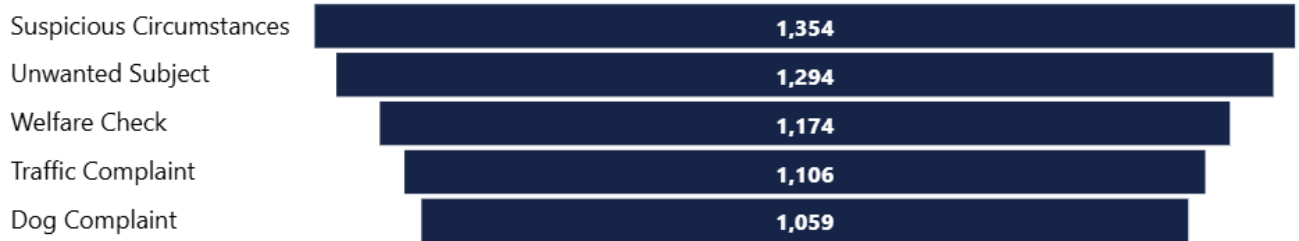
## Total Calls for Service
